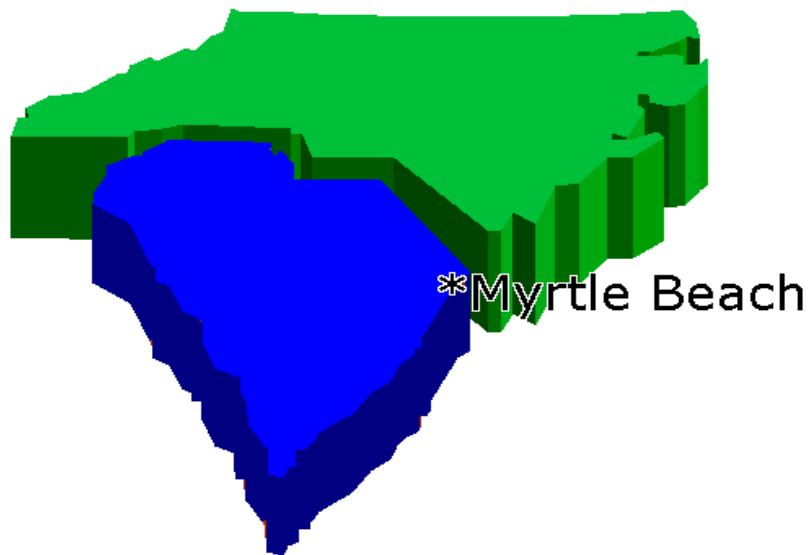

Topic: Myeloproliferative Disorders

Level: Advanced

Description: The JAK2 mutation is present in over 90% of patients with polycythemia vera (PV) and in over 50% of patients with Essential Thrombocythemia (ET) and Myelofibrosis with Myeloid Metaplasia (MMM). The BCR/ABL mutation is diagnostic and essential to the leukemogenic events that produce CML. Both have diagnostic, prognostic and therapeutic implications.

Topic: Does Aspirin Work? Monitoring Antiplatelet Response
Level: Intermediate

Description: Millions take aspirin to prevent heart attacks and strokes, and thousands of vascular patients take aspirin and clopidogrel to prevent secondary events. Many experience adverse events despite this therapy, and a number of clinical and laboratory studies now document antiplatelet resistance as a thrombotic risk factor. We review antiplatelet function, speculate on why therapy fails, and outline current laboratory assays.

Description: Hyperprolactinemia is caused by excessive production of prolactin by the pituitary gland. Common physiological causes include pregnancy and lactation while in pituitary adenoma is a frequent pathologic cause. However, the presence of a high molecular mass prolactin-IgG complex can also cause increased concentrations of prolactin. This can lead to a misdiagnosis of hyperprolactinemia that results in inappropriate and unnecessary follow-up procedures such as radiologic imaging, drug therapy, or surgery. This presentation will describe the nature and clinical significance of macroprolactin, its reactivity in immunoassays, and methods for detecting macroprolactin and reporting results.
